


Thank you to everyone for your kind wishes and messages – I have loved every minute of working here. Please see the attached letter as a final farewell.

Where?

The Summer Reading Challenge runs in 95% of UK public libraries and online at summerreadingchallenge.org.uk

When?

The Challenge runs throughout the summer holidays across the UK.

The Challenge begins in Scotland and Northern Ireland on Saturday 25th June, and in England and Wales on Saturday 9th July. Variations apply in some areas, so please check start dates with your local library service.

What are the benefits for your pupils and your school?

The Summer Reading Challenge can:

- Help to prevent the summer reading 'dip' for pupils
- Ensure your pupils are ready for their return to school in the autumn
- Support the transition between year groups and key stages
- Improve language skills, especially for those for whom English is a second language¹

Next steps for teachers

- In your classroom Talk to your pupils about the Challenge and help them engage with this year's theme. Let pupils know how they can sign up for the Challenge.
- **Talk to parents** Engage parents around the Challenge through newsletters.
- Get in touch with your library Contact your local library service to find out about what they're offering this summer.
- Get involved in the Challenge yourself! Read alongside your pupils and colleagues by taking part in the Teachers' Reading Challenge.

teachers' **reading** challenge

Teachers, School Librarians, and other education staff can also take part in their own Reading Challenge over the summer. The Teachers' Reading Challenge will help expand your knowledge of children's books as well as deepening your understanding of reading for pleasure pedagogy. Set your own reading goal, share your reviews with others, access resources and put what you've learnt into practice with your class in the new term. This year's Teachers' Reading Challenge runs from 27th June – 29th October 2022.

The benefits to your pupils

- The Summer Reading Challenge can contribute to the achievement of all your pupils.
- It keeps your pupils reading over the summer, maintaining their reading engagment and confidence ready for their return to school in the autumn.
- It supports the successful transition between year groups and key stages. The Challenge encourages children to become more independent in their reading, boosting their confidence and self-esteem.
- Children who take part in the Challenge are more enthusiastic about reading. The Challenge helps to bring together families and communities.
- An independent evaluation found statistically significant increases in reading frequency, reading enjoyment and reading confidence amongst children who participated in the 2021 Challenge versus those who did not.¹

How can children take part in the Challenge?

The Summer Reading Challenge is a flexible programme that is designed for all levels of ability.

At the library

1. A child will visit their local library and sign up to the Challenge for free. They receive their Gadgeteers core pack poster.

2. They set a personal reading goal for the summer (we recommend six books).

3. Borrow and read books, eBooks and audiobooks of their choice.

They can read anything they like: fiction, fact books, poetry, joke books, picture books, graphic novels, audiobooks...

4. Collect special incentives from the library each time they finish a book.

5. Receive a certificate and/or medal for taking part, or for reaching their Challenge goal.

In addition, libraries offer a wide variety of events and activities for families to enjoy throughout the summer.

Online

Alternatively, children can participate in the Challenge online.

1. Sign up at summerreadingchallenge.org. uk

2. Set a personal reading goal for the summer.

Receive book recommendations and tips for accessing books for free at home.

3. Each time they finish a book, the child adds it to their online profile and leaves a review. They unlock digital badges and online rewards along the way.

4. Unlock a certificate for reaching their Challenge goal.

Children can also play games, enter competitions, share book recommendations and more on our free, safe, moderated platform.

The Summer Reading Challenge is open to all primary school-aged children.

The 2022 Challenge launches on Saturday 25th June in Scotland and Northern Ireland, and on Saturday 9th July in England and Wales.*

*Regional variations may apply, so check with your local library to find out when Summer Reading Challenge activity will start and end in your local area.

2022 theme: Gadgeteers

Each year, the Summer Reading Challenge has a new theme. This year, we've teamed up with the **Science Museum Group** to create 'Gadgeteers', a Challenge that's all about science and innovation!

The 'Gadgeteers' materials feature six brand-new fictional characters (pictured on page 2). The Challenge will invite children to join these characters in using their curiosity and imagination to understand the science behind a whole range of interests, from fashion and technology to cooking and music.

The Gadgeteers characters are brought to life by top children's writer and illustrator, **Julian Beresford.**





Introduce the theme into your classroom

The theme of this year's Challenge is science and innovation. We want to spark children's curiosity and encourage them to see the science and innovation in everyday objects.



Helping your child to get a place at school A Guide for Parents and Carers

School is one of the most important parts of your child's life, and there is a lot to consider when deciding which school you'd like them to go to. As well as giving them a place to learn, school helps them to grow and prepare for adult life, and provides a safe place for them to spend time with friends under the supervision of trusted adults.

This guide will help you think about what matters most to you and your child when deciding where you'd like them to go to school.

Top 4 things to consider:

- 1 Which schools are in your local area?
- 2 What do you know about these schools? For example, their academic results, pastoral care, facilities or admissions criteria?
- 3 How would your child travel to and from your local schools? Please remember getting your child to school is your responsibility.
- 4 How might each school meet your child's needs?

There is a lot to think about, but there is support available to help you with your thinking and decisions:

Who can help me?

- Your circumstances will be different to other families. Talking to your child and their teacher/nursery/preschool could help you determine what matters most to you.
- If you are worried that your child has specific needs, get in touch with the school(s) directly, as they will be able to talk through your concerns.
- Think about how your child will get to school. If they might need public transport, check whether you are eligible for school transport and if you live on a bus route for your preferred schools.
- Talking to other parents might help you too, but remember that their opinions are their own point of view and what suits one child and family could be very different for another.
- Our friendly team are on hand to discuss any questions about applying for a school place and can help you to complete the application form too.

And here are some helpful tools and tips...

- To avoid disappointment on offer day, our top tip is that you make realistic preferences, which most likely means including your most local schools on your application form. You have up to 6 preferences and we recommend you use at least 3.
- Try our 'Find a school' tool to learn about your local schools and get links to further information about each.
- Go to an open day or visit the school. This is the best way to get a sense of how the school will meet your needs. You can find the details of their open days on their websites.

Make realistic preferences.

You can choose up to six schools to include on your application. This tells us which schools are your 'preferences'. There's no guarantee that those schools will be able to offer your child a place, because each school has its own admissions policy, against which your application will be assessed.

> So, whilst you don't have to use all six preferences , we recommend that you include at least three schools on your application. You should also always include your priority (catchment) school, because this is the school that is most likely to be able to offer your child a place.

> > Each school's admissions policy can be found on the 'Find a school' website. Look closely at the over subscription criteria to understand how your application will be assessed.

MYTH BUSTER

If I live in a priority area, does that guarantee my child a place at that school?

No - living in the priority area for a school does not guarantee a place. This is because schools have a limited number of places and there may be more children that live closer or meet other higher priority oversubscription criteria than your child.

MYTH BUSTER

If I only put one school down on the application form, does that guarantee my child a place at that school?

No, and by doing this, you are increasing the risk of your child not having a place at a local school at all. So, use at least three preferences, including your priority school. If there is no place available at the schools you selected, you will be offered a place at the next nearest school which has capacity. This might be a school you don't know much about, it could be some distance away, and you might feel it does not meet your family's needs.

Making an application

- You will need to complete your application on the parent portal. Instructions on how to do this can be found on our website.
- Apply online for Secondary schools by 31 October.
- Apply online for Reception and Junior applications by 15 January.
- If you apply late you are unlikely to get your preferred school, because you will be allocated a place after everyone who applied on time.
- You must have evidence that proves your child normally lives at the address you've used on your application.
- We will get in touch with your current school to let them know if we have received an application from you.
- Please remember you will not be able to contact schools during school holidays, so make sure to plan ahead for visits or discussions.
